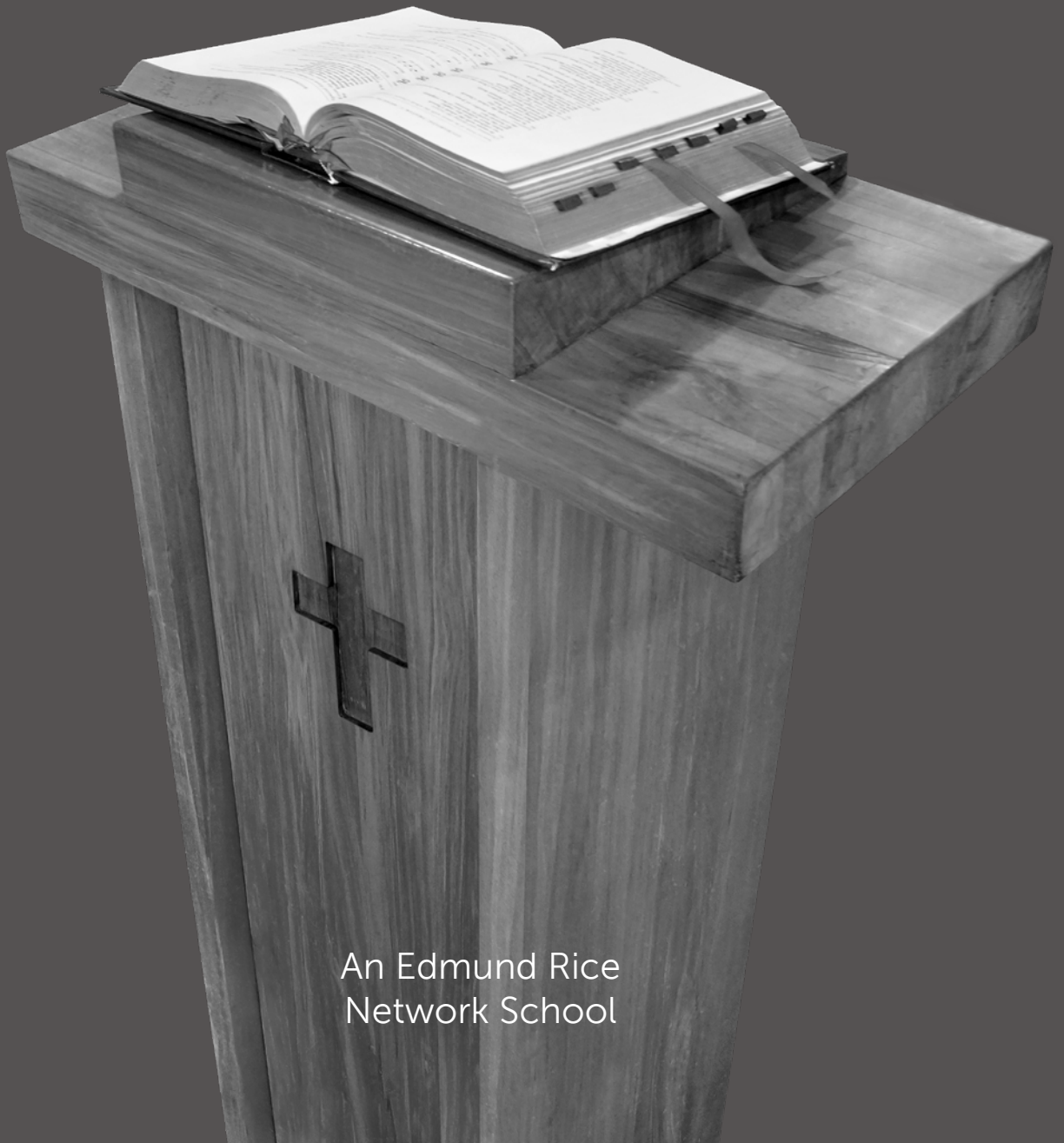

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Principal's Report

MR CHRIS ROONEY

When we were planning the Theme for 2020 we agreed on the quote from Deuteronomy 31:6 **Be strong and of good courage**. It is part of the conversation between Moses and his successor Joshua with Moses reassuring him that the Lord will never fail or forsake him. 2020 has certainly been a year where we have had to rely on our faith to continue to be strong and courageous. With this in mind, I share this quote from Michelle Obama.

"You should never view your challenges as a disadvantage. Instead, it's important for you to understand that your experience facing and overcoming adversity is actually one of your biggest advantages."

COVID-19 has had a profound impact on the entire planet, but I will confine my thoughts on its impact on the Liston Community.

Year 7 and Year 13 were particularly disadvantaged. For Year 7 the transition from primary school to Liston College was abruptly ended after barely six weeks. It certainly made the transition more difficult but with the commitment of the teachers and the support of the parents we continued with our efforts and can say we managed it successfully. The Year 7 students missed out on the Liston Day experience. Hopefully 2021 will provide this opportunity for them as Year 8 students.

Year 13 missed out on many events which help to define the last year of school. There was no School Ball – despite several attempts to re-schedule it. The Mother-Son High Tea was cancelled along with the Father-Son Breakfast. The Open Evening was



literally the first casualty of the Level 4 Lockdown. All of these events offer leadership opportunities for Year 13 students. Unfortunately for 2020 they were denied.

Other events or programmes which were cancelled or postponed had a negative impact on the school. The Sacramental Programme was postponed. Fortunately, Fr. Kevin has been able to resume this so that candidates for the sacraments will be ready for Liston Day 2021. The Monday Mass was significantly disrupted.

The Winter Sports Season was cancelled. While this was a sensible decision by College Sport, it did mean that the Year 13 sports players missed out on the opportunity to complete their sports representation of the College in their final year.

Students lost nine weeks of in-school teaching and learning. This is almost a complete term and has the

potential to impact negatively on the achievement of NCEA students.

A number of PTFA fund-raising events were cancelled. The same applies to Old Boys Society fund-raising events. These are important not only as fund-raising events to benefit the College but they are significant community-building events which are vital to the life of the College.

The loss of International Student numbers and resulting income had a major impact on the budget which had to be revisited. Budget-holders recognised the need for reduced budgets and willingly adjusted their spending priorities accordingly. The Board was able to make the necessary adjustments without having to reduce staff or hours. This was certainly one of the significant achievements for the Board this year.

WHAT HAVE I LEARNED?

There is so much more to the life of a school than simply teaching and learning. I have just listed some of the events which had to be cancelled or postponed. They are a huge part of the life of the College. Without them we have a much less rich experience. This true community dimension has been missing for much of the year.

As we have returned from the lockdowns a little of this normal community involvement has returned. I suspect that as we have to learn to live with Covid, we will have to continue to work to maintain our community building.

We teach the students to be resilient – we as teachers had to practice what we were preaching. I have reflected on this in the light of the way the staff have responded to the challenges of the disrupted teaching programme. Resilient people:

- Acknowledge that obstacles are there to be overcome.
- They tend to look at setbacks and failures as learning opportunities to do better.
- They focus their energy more on things and situations that are within their control.
- They are committed to the goals they've set for themselves.

I can honestly say that the 'can do' attitude of the staff during the reality of this year epitomises their innate

resilience, like how to take part in a Zoom meeting!

Immediately prior to the first COVID lockdown the Liston Online Community website was launched. While members of the public can go to <https://connect.liston.school.nz> and view news and events, Liston Alumni (past and present students, staff, parents and friends) can access membership benefits by registering on the site. Benefits include free advertising of your business via the Business Networking & Mentoring Hub, a search engine to locate and engage with other Old Boys via the secure Members Area, and the ability to update your User Profile and interests such as attendance at sports matches, jazz concerts, cultural performances, speaking to Year 13 students before they leave school, offering work experience et cetera.

It has been heartening to see the Liston wider community engage

with the new website. Old Boys within New Zealand and around the world have willingly written articles for the *Listonian*, produced video messages for current students during lockdown, offered to mentor Year 13 students as they begin life at university, and have taken the opportunity to advertise their businesses.

A further key development for the Advancement Office in July 2020 was the formal launch of the Liston College Foundation Fund (LCFF), managed by Auckland Foundation. The purpose of the LCFF is the advancement of Liston College in perpetuity. Projects include but are not limited to scholarships, sports coaching and resources, development of music and cultural performances, out of classroom educational experiences and capital projects within the College.

Having Auckland Foundation professionally manage Liston's Fund has been a real boon to our College, rather than going through an onerous process of setting up a charity with the extensive compliance requirements that didn't exist 5-10 years ago.

Auckland Foundation has a reputation for facilitating effective giving – giving that is real and has a positive impact – and its Fund Manager, Harbour Asset Management, has a credible history of high return on investment.

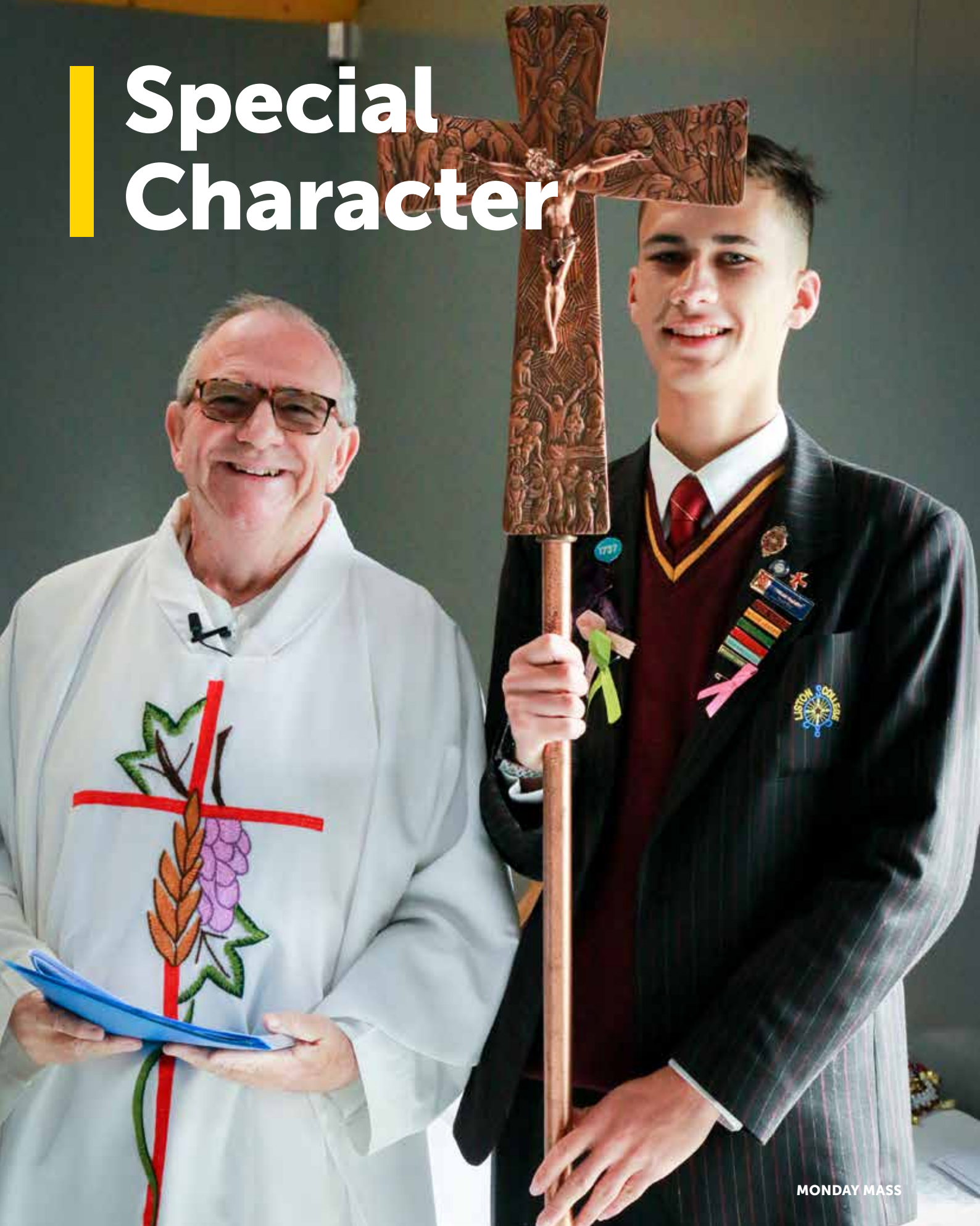

Let us prove our heart's affection while we have them near.

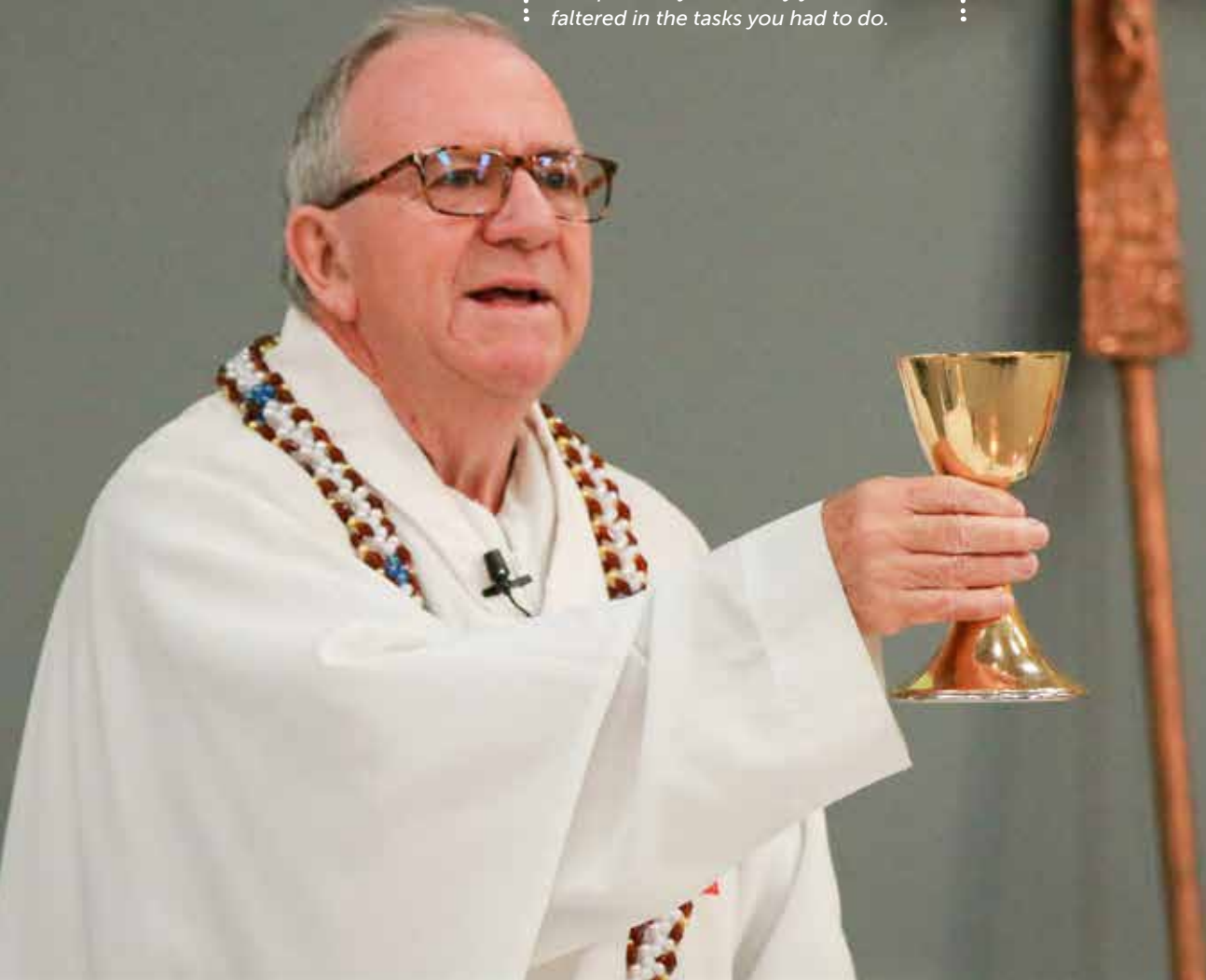

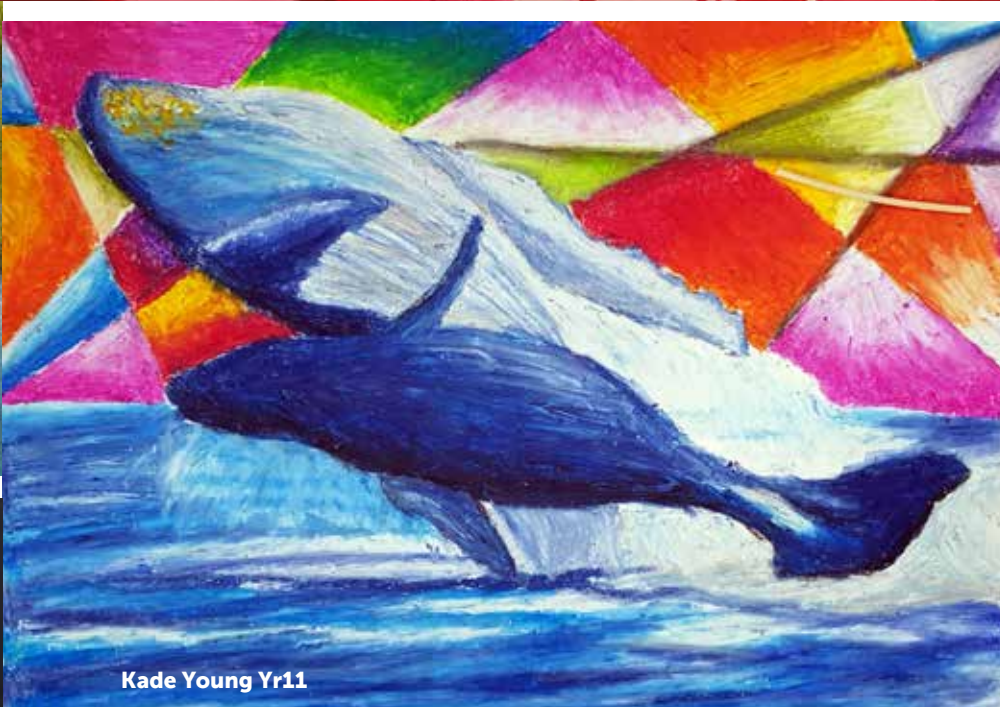

Science

UNIVERSITY OF AUCKLAND ENGINEERING SCIENCE COMPETITION

The Liston College team consisted of Matthew Ross, Micah Sullivan, Jacob Mathew and Michael Kennedy, gained a Highly Commended Award. There were eight highly commended teams that narrowly missed out on the three prize winning spots.

This was a fun and challenging competition involving engineering-based problem-solving. We had to use advanced mathematics and technology to solve real-world engineering, business and industrial problems.

For eight straight hours we had to toil over a question sent from the university: *How many satellites can be launched into orbit before astronomers on Earth can no longer observe the night sky without interruption?* Hours were thrown into research, discussions were had developing an accurate model, fancy equations were found, and by the end of it we were happy to have developed a somewhat reasonable answer – 64,000-700,000 satellites.

The experience was fulfilling; we learnt more about a field of study alien to us, had a lot of fun and came away with positive memories to look back on.

THE NEW ZEALAND BRAIN BEE CHALLENGE

This competition is for high school students in Year 11 to learn about the brain and its functions, learn about neuroscience research, find out about careers in neuroscience and to dispel misconceptions about neurological and mental illnesses. This year, three of our Level 1 Science students participated in this challenge – they were: Marco Patajac, Conrad Ang and Kieran Sullivan.

Due to Covid-19, these students only had the opportunity to participate in Round 1 of the competition. During Brain Awareness Week, our students had to study neuroscience material through Education Perfect - Brain Bee lessons. They then completed a 40 minute online in-class quiz to determine their knowledge and understanding of the structure and function of the brain.

Hopefully in 2021, Marco, Conrad and Kieran can represent Liston College through Round 2 and 3, National Finals and International Finals in Round 4.

ROTARY SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY FORUM

Careers

Virtual open days and online Zoom tertiary presentations became the norm this year for students exploring future pathways, due to the impact of Covid-19.

In the midst of this 'unprecedented' year, the new and timely Liston College Careers website was launched. This has given students, parents and their whanau online access to careers-related resources, upcoming events and news items.

The new website (careers@liston.school.nz) is aimed at supporting students in their career exploration, planning and transition from school. Information can be accessed on tertiary study, trades pathways, scholarships, university accommodation, student loans, applying for jobs, CV writing and

much more. By subscribing via the website, students and parents are able to receive a weekly Careers Newsletter.

During the first lockdown, Year 13 students attended presentations via Zoom while at home to find out about tertiary study options with the University of Auckland, Massey University and Unitec Polytechnic. This was an interesting dynamic and students also had to adapt to the very different experience of virtual open days and even virtual expos.

Fortunately, AUT had already visited Liston pre-lockdown but once we were back at school and in Level 1, a number of other presentations were able to go ahead including Victoria University and the University of Canterbury (viewed via Zoom in the classroom). In person talks were given by New Zealand Police, the Defence Force, Techorium (IT and computing), BCITO (construction trades) and ETCO (electrical trades). The police session featured our own community Police

Officer, Paul Stanko, his son Regan who spoke about his experience applying to join the force, and Pacific Liaison Officer, Michael Chan Foung. These were all great opportunities for senior boys to discover more about different careers.

Senior Pasifika students were able to attend the first of four scheduled AUT workshops at school to encourage them to learn more about their identity, future self and the university pathway. Unfortunately, the other sessions had to be cancelled.

In Term 3, some degree course planning was also able to take place for Year 13s under the guidance of visiting tertiary providers. Speakers from a range of health professions also shared their career journeys with boys including nursing with our new School Nurse Joe Auimatag and podiatry (Lynn Chen). An old boy Alex Lim, studying dentistry at the University of Otago, gave first-hand advice and tips to boys wanting to pursue the competitive pathways of dentistry and medicine. 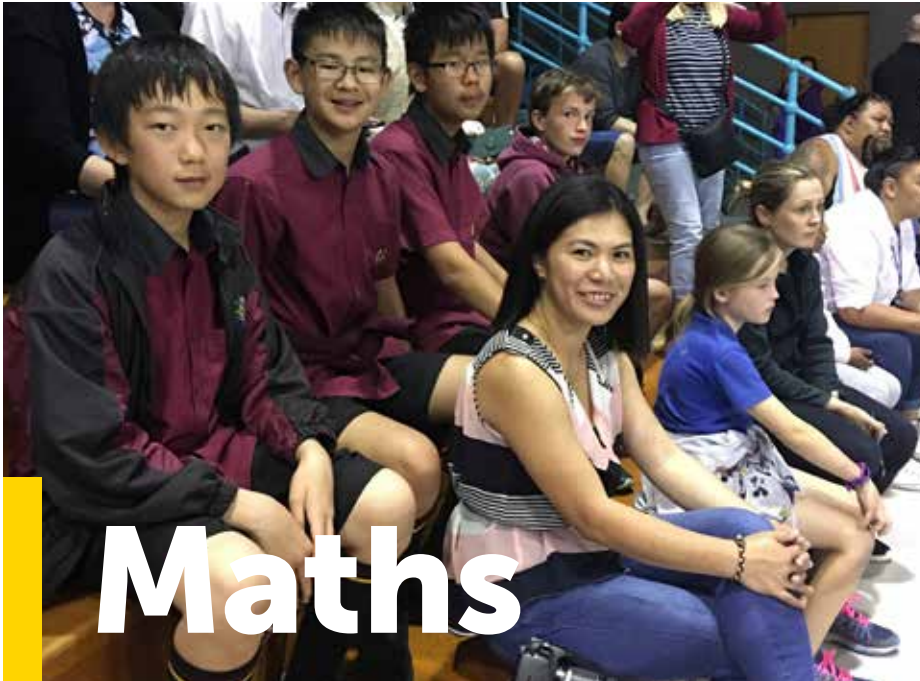
PARLIAMENT PAPER

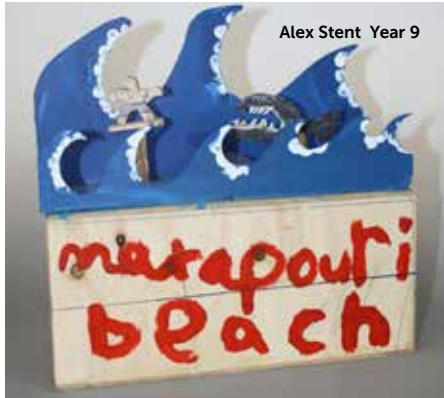

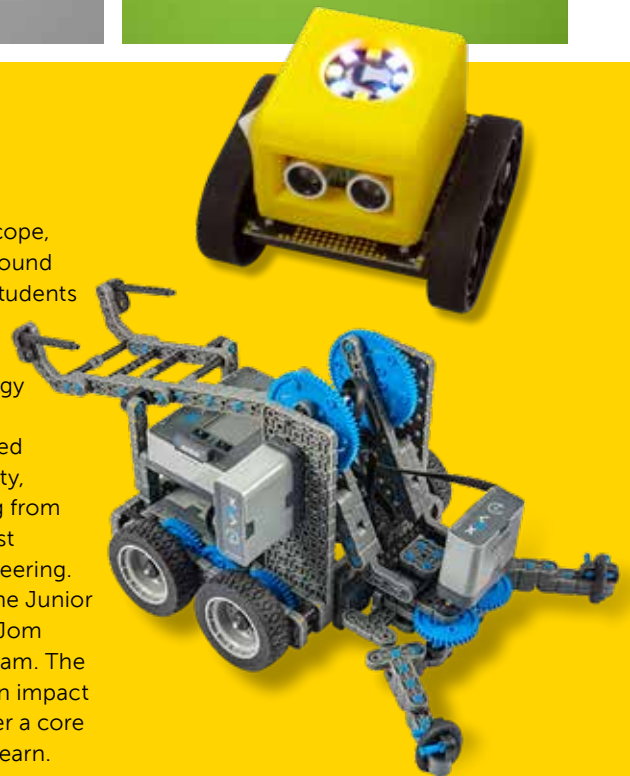

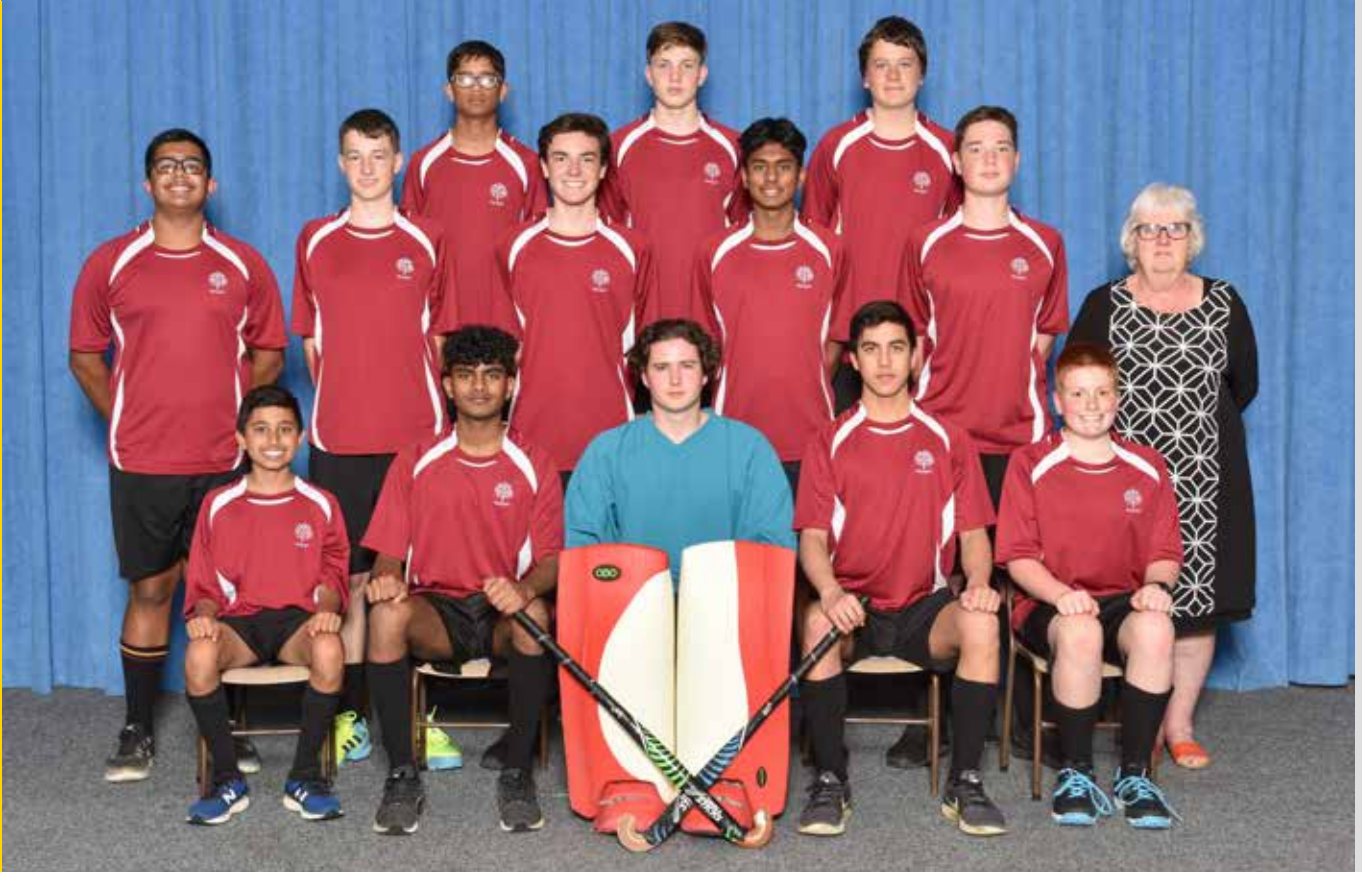

Tabletop RPG

“The air deep down in the ruin is cold and musty, no one has been here for a very long time, possibly hundreds of years. Your torch illuminates the mildew-stained stone walls as you travel deeper along the corridor. Before long, you start to hear a distant sound of something slowly breathing. Judging from the sound, it must be very large. Rounding a corner, the narrow corridor opens out into a large chamber faintly lit by the glow of phosphorescent fungus. In the centre, apparently asleep sprawled out on the ground, is a gigantic cave troll. Next to its hand on the ground is a spiked wooden club larger than any of you. You know the doorway to the treasure room is meant to be on the opposite side of this chamber, but you can’t see that far away in the darkness. What do you do?”

In Tabletop Role Playing Games (The most famous of which is ‘Dungeons and Dragons’), this is the sort of problem we deal with each session. Our Game Master narrates each part of the adventure we are undertaking and we decide how to take on each situation.

In this case, one option could be that we try to sneak around the troll to find the door (which could be trapped, locked, hidden, or not even there) and risk waking it up. It is entirely up to us with how each situation is dealt with and there is no going back once we have made our call. Once we have decided what we want to do, the Game Master will guide us onward and narrate what happens next.

Our decisions we make as a team also impact on what happens in the world of our game. Deciding to

investigate the source of a sound late at night could lead us to discover an ancient dungeon that we otherwise never would have found.

Each session leads into the next, so we end up with a continuous adventure week-to-week where we amass treasures, gold and new NPC friends that could help us out in future adventures.

Each member of our group is important since everyone’s character has such different skills and abilities to offer in and outside of battle. For example, Daniel is a sneaky Elf rogue who fights with a longbow, Orion is a charismatic and persuasive Half-Elf paladin and Antonio is a super-intelligent Dragonborn wizard that can wield magic for all sorts of situations.

There is ‘permadeath’ in this game –

if your character dies, that is it and you have to create a new character. We all need to think carefully about how we approach each situation because of this. We’ve come close to losing a character a few times, but fortunately nobody has died. Yet!

To play, we use special dice – up to 20 sides! A lot of our successes rely on good rolls of our dice and playing to our characters’ strengths! Sione might roll a 5, and the Game Master would start narrating how his axe might scrape against a wall in the chamber making a noise loud enough to wake the troll, forcing us into combat!

Special figures, charts and maps are used, with charts helping us in battle because then we know exactly how far we are from our enemies because we can only move certain distances each turn.

We have had an exciting year exploring dungeons and befriending dragons that can transform into human form, fighting nasty bandits and sorceresses, solving puzzles and reading maps together. We also have uncovered a range of neat magical items that we use in a huge range of different ways to help our characters and each other out. We cannot wait to continue our adventure next year!

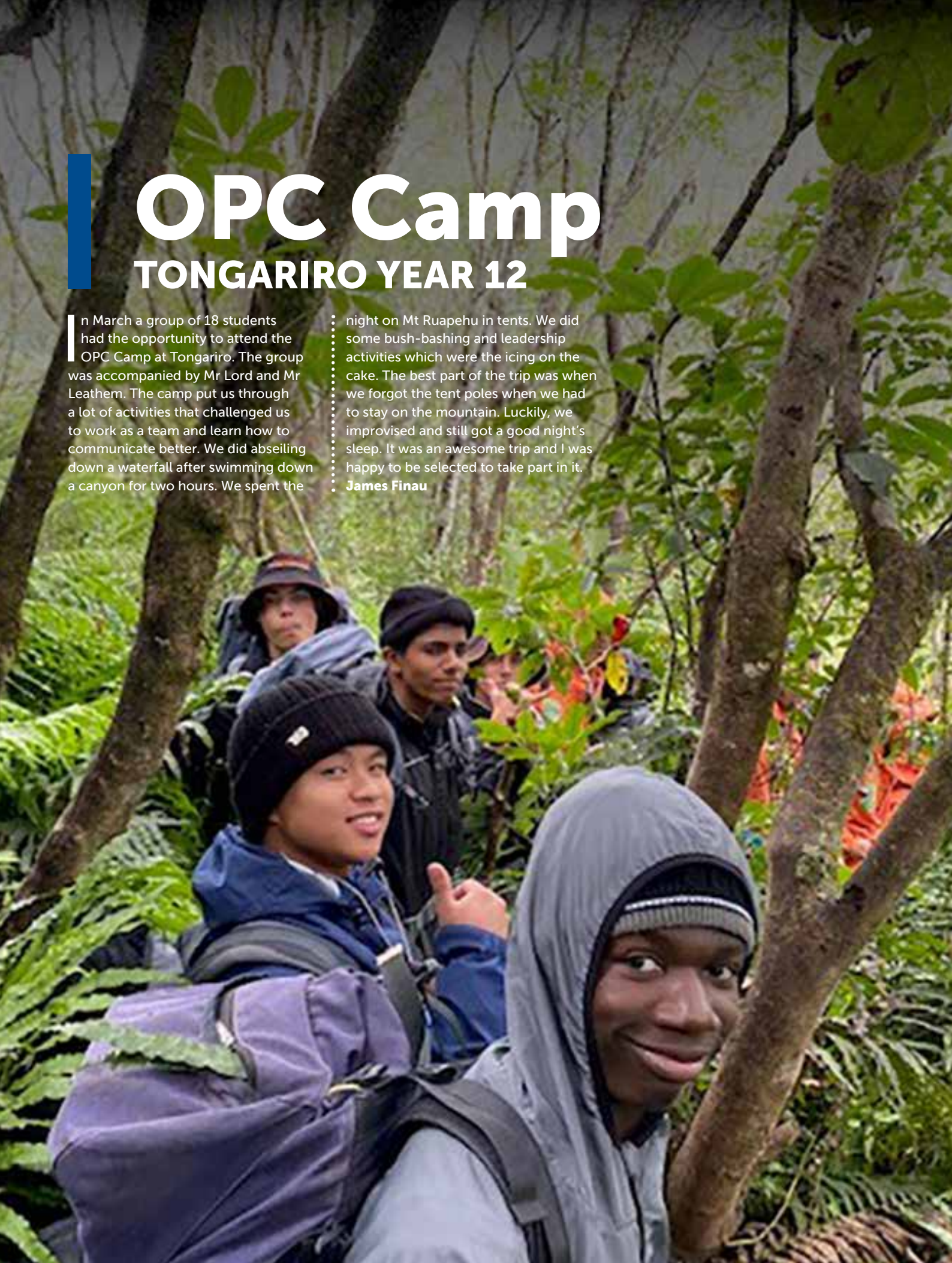
OPC Camp

The worldwide Covid-19 pandemic changed this year for everyone. New Zealand schools showed an amazing flexibility with the introduction of online e-learning.

LISTON COLLEGE UNDER COVID-19

On the afternoon of Monday March 23, the Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern announced an immediate lift in the Covid-19 alert status from Level 2 to Level 3, with a lift to Level 4 at 11.59pm on Wednesday 25 March. This means people were instructed to stay at home, schools and non-essential businesses were to close and travel was severely limited.

This lockdown was to affect all New Zealanders for seven weeks until 18 May, when the nation moved into Level 2. In August, we experienced another Level 3 lockdown, meaning schools were once again closed for two and a half weeks.

For eight weeks, Liston College had to adapt to this "new normal", delivering classes online, and for much of the year, we had to look at different ways of

carrying out what was, considered last year to be normal school activities, such as assemblies, prizegiving, end of year mass, and the list goes on.

LEARNING FROM HOME

There is no doubt that 2020 was a year where everybody in our school community learnt something new. On the afternoon of Monday 23 March, staff abruptly put down the whiteboard markers and students put up the chairs and stepped away from our classrooms.

Instead, staff and students created makeshift workstations at the dining table, on our beds, on the lounge floor, in order to enter an online learning experience that challenged staff, students and whanau alike.

We all had to adapt very quickly to a combination of Zoom calls or Teams Meetings, workbooks via NZPost, or

lessons that appeared in our inbox, that required written work, video uploads, virtual class readings, classes in the garden, or trying to meet the demands of Mr Morath's virtual PE Lessons.

Staff and students alike managed to follow a timetable that allowed our work hours to fit in with our bubble's walk around the block.

Like all industries, we learnt new ways of creating, engaging, completing and communicating, and returned in mid-May with a new perspective and set of skills.

Many teachers continued their online learning approaches in the classroom, and students continued to help to expand the possibilities of course content and develop their digital literacy, all in time for Level 3 lockdown experience in August.

As a school community it was a



learning experience for us, trying to get the balance right, and having taken on student and family feedback, we refined and adapted our online learning approach to best suit the community. Microsoft Teams was our preferred platform and continues to be the school-wide hive of learning activity.

Students continued to showcase their talents, grow their skills and challenge themselves across a range of subjects.

Many Liston students and staff were to lead the school with their confidence in the virtual world; our Deans team videos emphasised the importance of wellbeing and schoolwork, life balance, students cooked for their families, learnt to play a new instrument, Year 7s demonstrated 'how-to sports' videos as part of the West Auckland Wonders unit, Year 8s created cyclones-in-a-bottle as part of their natural disasters unit, and many more exciting learnings were taken from our lockdowns.

Thank you to our school whanau, to all our mums, dads, grandmas, grandads and wider family who worked alongside our boys to learn new content, experience online apps, troubleshoot, and completed engaging, challenging and necessary tasks. Our community spirit and determination ensured our students were continuing to learn and develop during such an unusual time.

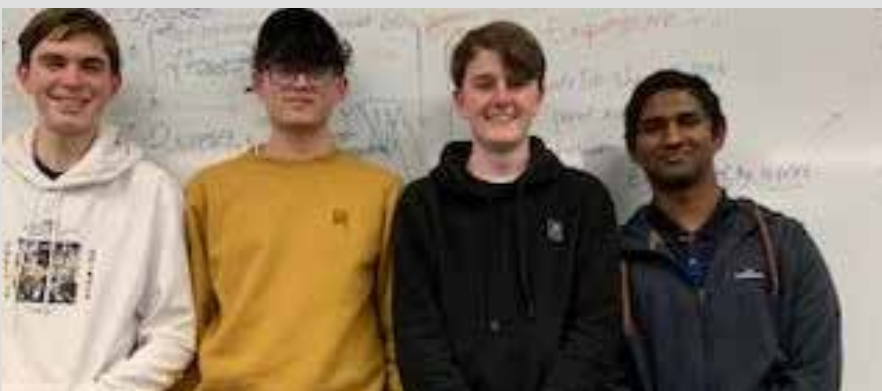
CHESS TEAM

Man values in their life post school and of staying connected with one another. To that end, students were encouraged to register on the Liston Online Community website <https://connect.liston.school.nz>

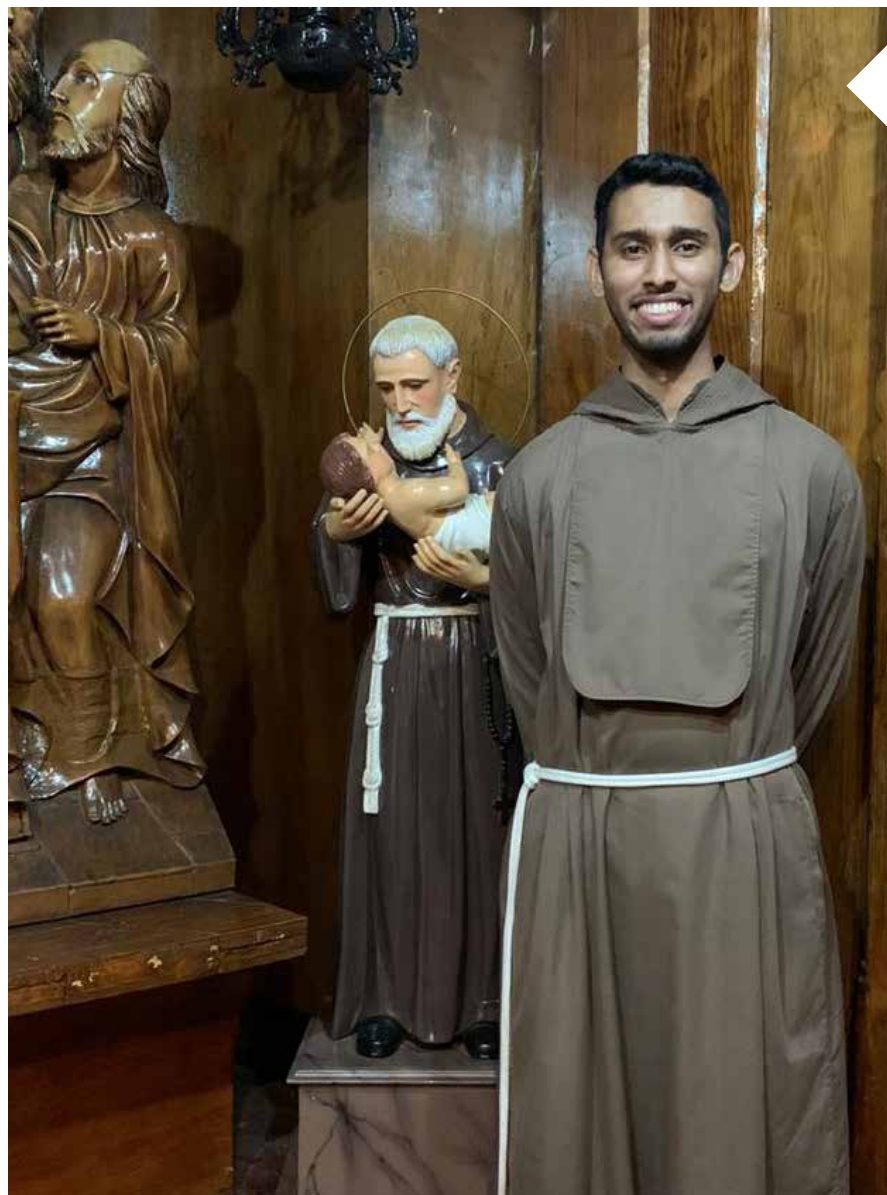
FOUNDATION STUDENTS GET TOGETHER
