Principal's Reflection

MR CHRIS ROONEY

When we were planning the Theme for 2020 we agreed on the quote from Deuteronomy 31:6 **Be strong and of good courage**. It is part of the conversation between Moses and his successor Joshua with Moses reassuring him that the Lord will never fail or forsake him. 2020 has certainly been a year where we have had to rely on our faith to continue to be strong and courageous. With this in mind, I share this quote from Michelle Obama.

"You should never view your challenges as a disadvantage. Instead, it's important for you to understand that your experience facing and overcoming adversity is actually one of your biggest advantages."

he first point I would like to make is that it is very hard to believe that 22 years have passed so quickly. When I succeeded Mr. Frank Huckle the school had a roll of 586 with a teaching staff of 40 and a support staff of 10. Today we have a maximum roll of 800, a teaching staff of 53 and a support staff of 18. The school is now poised to grow again as the pressure increases on the places available for enrollment. When I was appointed one of my goals was to change the uniform and I tried and failed at my first attempt. But I learned a valuable lesson from this. When making changes timing is vital for success. I presented my thoughts to the Board several years later and the idea was approved. I also changed the colour of the exterior paint this time at the first attempt.

The student population has become much more ethnically diverse reflecting the population of West Auckland, I introduced the idea of having the national flag for each ethnic group in the College. These are blessed at Liston Day in the Cathedral and are placed in the chapel. Everytime we enrol a student whose national flag is not on display we add this to the others. Currently we have 76. The staff also reflects the ethnic diversity of the area. I think it is essential for good relationshipbuilding to have the staff reflect the composition of the student body.

I was being interviewed by Caleb Susabda the Head Prefect and Zyrus Heteraka, one of his Deputies, and they asked me to comment on the most signifacant change I made during my time as Principal. I had no hesitation in replying that the

introduction of Restorative Practices to relationship building across the school. It fits our Special Character as restoring relationships and forgiveness are at the heart of the Gospel message. Mr Rob McKenty as Director of Pastoral Care initiated the conversation about this change. The Board of Trustees at the time closed the school for three days before the end of year to allow the entire staff to have training in Restorative Practices. Each time a new member of staff is appointed they receive the same three day training. The success of this approach is evident in the positive relations between students and between staff and students. Many people who visit the school for the first time comment on how friendly and relaxed the feeling is around the school.

I think one of my greatest achievements has been the self-belief that the students now have with NCEA success. West Auckland students can



have a tendency to put themselves down and our boys could do so as well. Now, with Liston College outperforming so-called more prestigious schools, our students know they can do it. They now expect to maintain this



success. I am especially proud to see this self-belief in the boys and the effort to achieve the success.

One of the reasons for this selfbelief is the way we make explicit the qualities that make The Liston Man. We put this in front of the students at our masses and liturgies, at assemblies and meetings and in the messages the staff give the students on a constant basis.

One of my practices was to greet the students and parents at the Rathgar Road entrance most mornings. I enjoyed the random conversations which arose usually without warning. One of these conversations began with a question. I think it was a Year 8 student who asked me 'Mr Rooney do you enjoy your job?' It was the first time anyone had asked this in such a direct manner and I had to think for a moment. I replied that yes I enjoyed my job – most of the time. I told him that about 90% of the time I enjoyed being the




Principal of the College. When I look back on my Principalship I can honestly say that the answer I gave the boy is correct. To have maintained such a high level of job satisfaction is why I have enjoyed the 22 years of service as Principal.

I am looking forward to having the freedom to make spontaneous decisions about travel and leisure time. I will be able to spend more time with Claire and my grandsons. I may even be able to work on my golf handicap.

When I announced my retirement to the Board in June I made the comment that they would have no difficulty in finding a suitable replacement for me. I stated that the College has a committed and caring Staff, a fabulous student body, a supportive Parent Community and a Board determined to do the very best for the College. This is what my successor, Mr Stephen (Steve) Dooley, inherits. I know he will build on the strong foundations and lead the College in the next stage of growth.

I thank the staff for their continuing excellent work. I thank the PTFA for their support of me and their commitment to the College. I thank the Board for their support and encouragement. Finally, I thank the parents for entrusting their sons to us at the College. It has been an honour and a privilege to serve you as the leader of the College and I will keep a keen interest in its future success.

wo lockdowns in Auckland in February and March 2021 made for a disruptive start to the first term, not only for Liston staff and students but also for many Old Boys' businesses. 

In 1999 I arrived at Liston College as Head of Physical Education. The Principal Mr Huckle remarked that the school was a welcoming place. I immediately realised what he was talking about as being greeted with a good morning at the start of school by several students was a refreshing experience.

he schools Micah statement states, "Act justly, love tenderly and walk humbly with your God" The Micah statement was a major factor in the introduction of Restorative Practices in the school in 2011. Restorative practice aims to build on the Catholic school values of respect, belonging and the daily practice of creating a climate of care. Twenty-two years later Liston College continues to be a welcoming place largely due to restorative practices.

Driven by successive Boards, Mr Rooney, Mr Houghton, staff and the PTFA the school buildings have seen the refurbishment of the staff area, building the new administration block plus R and TA blocks. Facilities such as outdoor basketball courts, turf area, weight room and drinking fountains have been largely dure to the willingness of students to take part in numerous workdays and community and staff help. All these improvements have made the school a more attractive place to work in.

The Special Character of the school has I believe been embedded and strengthen over the last 20 odd years. This is evident in the students, staff and community and in the everyday culture of the school. The last Special Character review found many reasons to commend the strength of the school's special character. While many people have been involved in this; Father Kevin, Mrs Skelton, Mr Swann, Mr Rooney and members of the Religious Education department need to be thanked for their efforts.

As a trained Physical Education teacher, sport has always played a big part in my life. Liston has continued to punch above its weight in a number sporting codes. While the last couple of years have been lean, Football. Cricket, Basketball and Rugby have all spent time in the top divisions of their codes. Staff and parents needed to be thanked for the countless hours given to coaching, managing, and supporting students in their extra-curricular activities. Special mentioned should go to Cuz McLaughlan who at the time of writing this report has been involved in several sports as a coach and manager for over 32 years.

One of the most enjoyable trips I personally have had was going with Cuz and the Waterpolo team to Wellington several years ago. Over the years I have been thrilled to hear of ex students who have fulfilled their dreams of playing at national level in their chosen sport. Today I try to watch any Listonian that may be playing on television. I sometimes have to stop myself yelling advice at the television that I may have done in past years while watching them from the side-line.

Education outside the classroom has continued to flourish although Covid has put a halt to some activities this past year. Alex Solomon took the first Year 12 Leadership camp to the Outdoor Pursuits Centre at Turangi back in 2000. This has continued with Alan Leathem overseeing this and the Year 10 OPC trip to Great Barrier Island. Year 8 camp at Lake Karapiro and Year 10 at Tawharanui Regional Park have been a highlight for many students organised by Mr Lord. We have been fortunate to have had the services of Mr. Ross Mckay an ex HOD of Physical Education for many of theses camps. Ross is one of the true outdoor educators left.

The Old Boys Society support the school especially as the 50th Jubilee is in Queens Birthday weekend 2024. has also strengthened over the years I have been at Liston. Through their fund raising they have made significant donations to school in a number of ways through scholarships, financial aid for camps and other activities. A number of Old Boys have been responsible for this, but credit must be given to Mr Swann and Mrs Ryan for their involvement. I would encourage all Old Boys to support events run by the Society as we especially want a full turnout at the 50th Jubilee celebrations over Queen's Birthday weekend 2024.

While a number of staff have made a difference at the school, three stand out to me. Firstly, Mrs Cathrine Skelton who for a number of years was Director of Religious Studies. The term "not on my watch" was often quoted to me when she wanted to support her viewpoint. Secondly Father Kevin, who has always been as joy to work with. Finally, Mr Rooney who after 45 years at the College, with 23 as Principal has been a fantastic servant of the school.

To all parents, staff and students I would like to thank you, as you are the heart and soul of the College. Many thanks on my behalf for making this a this a place I have enjoyed and wanted to come to work each day.



HUMANITIES DEPARTMENT



his year the junior students in the Humanities Department covered a variety of topics, building on their prior knowledge and experiences as well as broadening their understanding of the wider world. At Year 7 one of the highlights was building space rockets either digitally or physically to support their understanding of the 'Space Race'. Boys submitted their work by video with some making the weekly digital assembly.

Our Year 8 students explored ancient and modern cultures close to home and across the globe. This alongside their early topic of Kaitiakitanga has helped with grounding their understanding of themselves and their place in the world. Across Year 9, students built on the concept of self-identity, explored the impact East Asia has had and continues to have on the world, the role of government in our lives and explored the theme of empathy through a unit on refugees.

Our Year 10 students were given NCEA 'tasters' looking at Classics, History, Geography and Art History. This gave them an opportunity to explore new topics that would be available to them over the following years. Our senior classes worked through some trying conditions this year to produce great class work and were fortunate to experience education outside of the classroom during the early part of the year. This included trips to places such as the Auckland Museum, North Head, the America's Cup Village, Rotorua and Tongariro.

MUSEUM VISIT

In March, the Level 2 Architecture and Level 1 History classes went to the Auckland War Museum to complement a NCEA Internal Achievement Standards for subjects. Year 11 students obtained material for their 'perspective' 1.4 internal and gather some material for their 1.1 research internal on the threats to Auckland.

The Year 12 students gathered information and doing sketches of the classically inspired museum and ideally, we were aiming to visit Hotuni, the meeting house gifted from Ngāti Awa. However, a surprise visit and press conference from the Prime Minister prevented us from entering! As luck would have it, this structure did appear on the external exam! Nevertheless, it was a very informative trip. Two volunteers from the community brought their local expertise and knowledge of the museum.

NAVAL WAR MUSEUM

In June, Level 1 History went to the Naval War Museum at North Head to complement a NCEA Internal Achievement Standard. There, we were taken on a guided tour of the Torpedo Bay Museum and after lunch we walked up North Head to explore the various machine-gun pillboxes, disappearing guns and network of tunnels. Students became amateur first-hand historians when they were given the opportunity to work with the museum's primary resources in their research and archive area.

Geography

IN MAY 2021, THE LEVEL 3 GEOGRAPHY classes went to Rotorua for three nights and four days to conduct research on tourism development for an internal achievement standard.

The field trip involved exploring how the cultural environment of Rotorua's tourism had changed in New Zealand, by gathering primary and secondary sources of evidence to assist our answer. This involved students conducting a survey in groups where we would ask Rotorua tourists and residents a series of questions, in order to collate data and form conclusions.

Throughout this trip we were able to explore, attend, and do many Tourist activities while staying at YHA Rotorua Backpackers. We attended a Te Puia tour, learning about Maori culture and experiencing geothermal activity through the geysers, rode luges at Skyline Rotorua, gained a perspective of tourism development by the Rotorua museum education team, and rolled down tall hills in a giant inflatable ball filled with water at Zorb Rotorua. In doing this, we also interviewed many of the workers, owners, and managers to further substantiate our research.

Between the major activities, students were also able to thoroughly explore Rotorua city in our research and went to places such as the night market and the government gardens during our time there.

Our visit to Rotorua this year was a huge success and fun thanks to the organisation and well-planned agenda by Mr Devereaux, and the immense support from teachers, Mr Hughes, Mrs Vercoe and Mr Torres. It was truly a highlight of our year with many unforgettable memories and I hope the level 3 Geography class next year will be able to experience the same.

It was also a fun day, full of learning new things as well as discussing and deepening our understanding of Maori Pa sites, European Quarries, and the purpose of terracing.

LEVEL 2 TONGARIRO TRIP

IN APRIL 2021, YEAR 12 GEOGRAPHY STUDENTS headed

down to the Tongariro Volcanic Centre to conduct research for their 2.5 internal. Upon arrival at the Whakapapa Village Holiday Park next to the famous Tongariro Chateau, the class prepared themselves for the Tongariro Crossing they would be completing the next day. The students took seven hours and 34 minutes to complete the 19.4km Crossing, hiking past Mt Ngauruhoe and through three of the four craters of Mt Tongariro; the Red Crater, South Crater, and Central Crater. On the following day, the students conducted their geographic research to identify the spread and presence of vegetation at different altitudes. In order to answer the research objective, the class visited five locations or research sites,

conducting transects to identify specific vegetation species and drawing field sketches to visualise the surrounding environment at each site. One of the sites visited was Mt. Ruapehu, to get here the class went up the SkyWaka to Knoll Ridge where they ate and completed research at the highest café in the North Island the Knoll Ridge Chalet, 2020m above sea level. As a conclusion to their trip before departing on Saturday, the class went to Tokaanu Hot Pools to relax after three big days of hiking, driving, and research. The trip was a great experience filled with fun activities, memories, and bonding, on behalf of the class I would like to thank the parents, Mr Devereaux, Mr Hughes, and Mr McKay for their assistance in guiding and organising the trip to make it a success.

After our proud success in 2020, we are hopeful that next year we have more junior and senior teams with the opportunity to compete in the challenge with less interruptions.


JUNIOR PERSPECTIVE

VECTOR EPRO8 COMPETITION: LOCKDOWN EDITION


This was an alternative competition offered to the students to do at home with their family. Toby Hall from 8J entered this competition with his family, their team's name was Carter Constructions.

The Level 1 General Science class were lucky enough to manage to Visit Ambury Farm after the first lockdown. As always it was a valuable learning experience for the students as genetics can seem complex and theorical but becomes much clearer after seeing its effects on the farm.

We had a short introductory lecture on the history and economic implications of this branch of science and then visited the sheep pens to view the animals bred to incorporate useful genetic features. The boys also had the opportunity to examine wool samples and spin some carded wool.

At the cattle yard the differences between dairy and meat animals were explained and again some hybrid animals were seen. The tutors from Auckland Council were informative and entertaining. I believe we are extremely fortunate to be able to visit this facility in our city.

ENGINEERING SCIENCE COMPETITION


In early August, two groups of Year 12 and 13 students participated in the annual Engineering Science Competition organised by the Engineering Department of University of Auckland.

Despite the continued disruption caused by the Covid-19 pandemic, we were very fortunate that many careers events and programmes were able to go-ahead in the first half of the year.

A carpenter, electrician and plumber were interviewed on a trades panel which was a packed event attended by Year 11 to 13 boys. Old boy Danny Inglis also shared with students about his career as an architect.

In Term 2, a successful Māori and Pasifika Careers Evening was held which was attended by boys, parents and whānau. Three speakers shared their career stories: Roger Fua'aletoelau (Old Boy - Police Officer), Joe Auimatagi (our School Nurse) and Paul Amani (Old Boy - Quantity Surveyor). Tertiary, trades and training providers were on hand to offer advice as well. It was great to see other Old Boys manning stands including Samuel Coup (NZ Defence Force), Noah Smith (ETCO) and John To'ua-Kalava (NZ Police). In 2022, a larger Careers Evening is planned to be held for all Years 10 to 13 students.

Five Year 12 students had an exciting day in June finding out about the

LIBRARY REPORT



he Library is an extremely popular place to congregate at lunchtime – with 30+ students coming most days. Students love to read and research, play chess and cards etc.

We have a wonderful team of librarians – 25 in total – who work their rostered days. They help with creating displays, moving books around on the shelves, labeling books etc. When it comes to new book selection, they are happy to help choose books that are sent on approval from book sellers. They are an immense help with processing books through the library system – withdrawing old books and helping add new ones.



We have created a new section of the library – manga. This collectionwith graphic novels - are the most popular books issued and read from the library. Another collection of books "Quick Reads" was moved with the help of the librarians and are now being well browsed and issued.

4608 books were issued this year by 582 students an average of seven books per student. However, the top borrower took out 90 books!

The most popular series issued this year were *Tom Gates, Dog Man, Diary of a Wimpy Kids, Naruto,* and *Amulet.* With two books being taken out 18 times each (*Tom Gates* and *Amulet*).

Our librarian has once again met her personal challenge of reading her height in books – with 85 books read from the library.

The reading mentors programme met every Thursday at form time – a terrific way for students to form relationships and encourage reading.

The author Des Hunt visited the school and spoke to the Year 9 students.

He talked about his journey as a writer. He started life working as a science teacher, and wrote textbooks before writing fiction with a science/ environmental theme.
